One week after the New York City celebrated essential workers with a tickertape parade down lower Broadway, hundreds of healthcare workers marched through the streets around New York City Hill demanding passage of the Better Care Better Jobs Act to support homecare workers and the home health industry. The legislation would provide some \$400 billion in aid for homecare, an industry which has been battered by the pandemic. The money would shore up agencies and help create stable, good paying jobs so home health aides can continue providing the compassionate care on which their clients depend. Joining 1199ers and their allies at the rally were Congressman Hakeem Jeffries and SEIU EVP Rocio Saenz. "We homecare workers are essential," said Anna Couch Superville, an HHA with the Sunnyside and Personal Touch agencies. "And we demand that we be recognized as such, and that we are respected and protected."
